# The CHILD Projects

The Children's Identification & Location Database (CHILD) Project is a secure nationwide network and registry, maintained by the Nation's Missing Children Organization and National Center for Missing Adults – that will enable Sheriffs' Offices and social service agencies across the nation to locate and positively identify missing children and adults with iris biometric recognition technology.

The Child Project has been designed to help locate missing individuals through advanced iris biometric recognition technology by taking a simple high-speed digital photograph of the individual's irises.



### My 8 Rules for Safety

#### From the Molly Bish Foundation

- 1. I always check first with my parents or the person in charge before I go anywhere, even if it's with someone I know.
- I always check first with my parents or a trusted adult before I accept anything from anyone, even if it's someone I know.
- 3. I always take a friend with me when I go places or play outside.
- 4. I know my name, address, telephone number and my parent's names.
- 5. I say NO if someone tries to touch me or treat me in a way that makes me feel scared, uncomfortable or confused.
- 6. I tell my parents or a trusted adult if I feel scared, uncomfortable or confused.
- 7. I know its okay to say NO, and I know there will always be someone there to help me.
- 8. I am strong, smart and I know I have the right to be safe.



## If Your Child is Missing

#### Tips from the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children

If your child is missing from home, search the house checking closets, piles of laundry, in and under beds, inside old refrigerators—wherever a child may crawl or hide.

If you still cannot find your child, **immediately call** your local law-enforcement agency.

If your child disappears in a store, notify the store manager or security office. **Then immediately call your local law-enforcement agency**. Many stores have a Code Adam plan of action—if a child is missing in the store, employees immediately mobilize to look for the missing child.

When you call law enforcement, provide your child's name, date of birth, height, weight, and any other unique identifiers such as eyeglasses and braces. Tell them when you noticed that your child was missing and what clothing he or she was wearing.

Request that your child's name and identifying information be immediately entered into the National Crime Information Center (NCIC) Missing Person File.
